#### Dear Friends,

The final encyclical of Pope St. John Paul II begins with these words: "The Church draws her life from the Eucharist." This is a truth which "recapitulates the heart of

the mystery of the Church," as the Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" and "contains the Church's entire spiritual wealth."

Given that divine truth, I invite you to always entrust your intentions to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, in which Christ's sublime act of redemption is powerfully present.

When you make a Mass offering, the priest celebrates the Holy Eucharist for your intentions. These may be very personal, such as for your marriage, your children, your departed loved ones, for help with a particular need or some other special intention. You may also have Mass offered for more general intentions, for example, for peace, for the pastors of the Church or civil rulers, or in honor of the saints and angels.

Mass intentions are rooted in a very ancient tradition of the Church. The first Christians made offerings and brought gifts of food for the support of their priests and also the poor when they gathered together for worship.

Similarly, Aid to the Church in Need is currently supporting more than 40,000 priests and their work in the world's poorest countries with your Mass intentions. Without your offerings, many of them could not fulfill their pastoral duties, because both priests and the laity lack the most basic necessities, and their dioceses are unable to give them regular support.

Dear friends, we are only too happy to pass on your Mass intentions, as they do a great deal of good, whether you request single Masses, a Triduum (three Masses celebrated on successive days), a Novena (nine Masses), or what is known as a Gregorian Mass (30 Masses). A Gregorian Mass, which is celebrated for a departed soul, dates back to the time of Pope St. Gregory the Great, who had daily Masses celebrated for a monk who had died. At the end of 30 days, the monk appeared

to him in a vision and assured him that he had been freed from the pains of Purgatory.

Our faith tells us that departed souls in Purgatory can no longer do anything for themselves and are en-

tirely dependent on the intercession of the living and the mercy of God. There is nothing greater we can do for them than the celebration of Holy Mass, making it a very special act of love and mercy to intercede for them through the Sacrifice of the Mass.

As a result, I cordially invite you to consider having Masses offered, and promise you my prayers and blessings.

### You are in the hearts of priests all around the world!

Every year, your Mass intentions are received with the greatest joy by thousands of priests all across the globe. In many parts of the world, the faithful are too poor to support their shepherds. With these intentions, not only are they celebrating Mass for you, but you are providing a way for them to accompany their parishioners in defending their rights, in the spirit of Catholic social justice. Here are two examples from South Asia.

Father Herat Mondol ministers in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, in southeastern Bangladesh. He tells ACN: "We are working here among the Indigenous tribes who live in the hill country. This is a very remote region, where we travel mostly on foot. We cross rivers and climb mountains in order to reach the faithful. There are only a few small towns and villages where there are chapels, and so we usually gather the villagers in some place where we can celebrate Mass and teach the catechism, usually in their homes."

His brother priest, Father Paulus Murmu, adds: "These people have basically been robbed of their human rights. They don't formally own any land of their own, so they suffer attacks by the loggers, who come in and cut down the rainforest. In this situation, I minister to our people pastorally. Despite the many dangers and tensions they face, their faith remains strong. I am very grateful to you for the Mass stipends and only too happy to celebrate Masses for the intentions of our dear benefactors."

The priests teaching in seminaries are


Oblate Fathers in Bangladesh. of North and Northeast India, where the Catholic faithful belonging to ethnic minorities still long for pastors of their own.

On their way to see the faithful—two

Father Sebastian Rodrigues is one of the priests responsible for the seminarians' formation. He writes, "Celebrating the Holy Mass and experiencing the Lord in the Eucharist is a great joy. # Our Child's Bible celebrates its 45<sup>th</sup> birthday!

Aid to the Church in Need has been publishing and distributing its little Child's Bible God Speaks to His Children since 1979. It has been translated into 194 different languages and over 51.7 million copies have been printed—all thanks to your help!

On occasion, this little book has transformed lives. As a child, Rolando Montes (pictured below), from Oca in the Camagüey region of Cuba, was given a copy by his parish priest. In the socialist-dominated Cuban state, Bibles were a rare treasure. Today, he himself is a priest. He even took his Child's Bible with him to the seminary, "It was through it that I fell in love with God, and this God awakened in me the vocation to the priesthood," he explains. Now, as an adult, he reads the Sacred Scriptures in their entirety, but he nonetheless confesses, "This little book remains my favorite Bible, because through it I came to know Jesus Christ."

Many children have been known to press this little red book to their hearts and kiss it when they receive it. Some of them have never seen a book before, and many couldn't have dared to dream they would ever own one. The brightly colored illustrations immediately appeal to them, and there is also an accompanying poster series that can be used for teaching purposes. Together, they are a simple but effective way of conveying the Gospel message to children.

In Northwest **Kenya**, for example, *God Speaks to His Children* is used by Sister Lilian Omari among the Turkana people. Like the better-known Maasai, the Turkana also live a traditionally nomadic lifestyle. Many have adopted a more settled way of life now, but most still roam with their herds of cattle, going wherever there is

pasture and water to be found. Most only speak their native language, and so the official languages of Kenya-English and Swahili—are foreign languages to them. But they can understand the Child's Bible since it was printed in their own Turkana language, and it is loved even by those who cannot read or write. "Given the colorful illustrations in the book, they can look at it, leaf through it, handle it, and of course, even listen to the Word," explains Sister Lillian. It is one of the means that has helped us to teach the faith in this region. We are grateful to all ACN's benefactors who have supported this project and made it possible for the Child's Bible to be translated into so many different languages."

It is important that the children do not encounter the Word of God as something foreign, but as something familiar, in their own language, as a voice that speaks directly to their hearts.



I grew up in Ireland with a wonderful tradition of having a Mass celebrated not only for the repose of the soul of the dead but also for the soul of the living. We would offer what we called "Mass bouquets" for wedding anniversaries, birthdays, or for someone's success in exams. In other words, it was a way to celebrate something wonderful. The message of congratulations would be conveyed in a greeting card and would relay that a Mass was going to be celebrated for the receiver. As the recipient of such a "bouquet," I was moved to know that a Mass somewhere—in my home parish or in a missionary country—was being celebrated for my intention. What a great gift that infinitely surpassed any beautiful flower bouquet.

Thankfully, this tradition continues in many countries today and brings not only joy to the recipient, but it also ensures that the celebrant has a small income. This is particularly important for the priests, who receive Mass intentions through ACN and who are totally reliant on the offerings of their faithful, who themselves often struggle to survive.
