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When it comes to healing, you are an exceptional support!

For many years, Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) has been able to count on you to support members of the Church who have suffered trauma as a result of conflict and war. Thanks to you, people are finally regaining their will to live as well as their mental and physical health, allowing them to serve their Christian and local communities once again.

"We live in a society that is ravaged by war, banditry, kidnapping, and bad governance with low earnings and high cost of living," writes Fr. Gabriel from the Diocese of Katsina in Nigeria. "These and more have made many people enter into psychological and spiritual depression. Working as an assistant parish priest at St. Theresa's Catholic Church, Funtua, Katsina State, Nigeria, where the church was burnt down two consecutive times as a result of a religious crisis, I encountered people who experienced the ugly events and saw how traumatized they were. Many kept counting their losses... As a parish priest for about two years, I discovered that a lot of people, the educated and uneducated, cannot differentiate between the situations in their lives which are spiritual and those that are psychological and medical, and require medical or psychological attention."





Without you, it wouldn't be possible to respond favourably to the requests for healing coming in from all over—requests that affect the people described in Fr. Gabriel's letter. But with you, training programs like the one at the Lux Terra Psycho-Spiritual Institute (PSI) in Kenya are restoring souls.

"Drawing from the best of the Christian spiritual tradition, and using up-to-date psychotherapeutic tools, approaches, and methodologies for healing troubled minds, and taking into cognizance the peculiar African historical, religious, and sociological context, PSI offers high-quality professional training in an environment of faith and Christian devotion," describes the institute.

You are among those who can support the healing of our sisters' and brothers' wounded souls. In this Jubilee Year, continue to give hope!

You are nourishing bodies and souls!

This isn't the first time you have read about Mozambique. Time and again, you have responded with compassion to calls for help from the Church in the northern province of Cabo Delgado. Your generosity is always received with immense gratitude.

"It's only thanks to that help that I can speak today," shared a 54-year-old father who lost two of his eight children to the ongoing violence in this region since 2017. "Me, my family, and the other families, we are very grateful... Without this help, we wouldn't be able to live."

Sister Aparecida Queiroz coordinates an emergency unit in this region. She wrote to us:

"The image contemplated by the missionary teams in these areas hit by attacks is that of 'stunned, sad' faces, of people in 'despair.' The help received from ACN was the most beautiful realization of what it is to be in the presence of God, who welcomes and feeds the hungry. Once again, thank you so much for your solidarity, which transforms people's faces of pain into faces of hope." A donation of \$55 helps feed a family of six for one month. A spiritual life to nurture

Faithful to its primary mission, ACN continues to support pastoral life, even in the midst of violence. Thanks to your big heart, priests and religious sisters manage to visit the 15 parishes at least three times a year. Access is by plane, as the road to get there has become too dangerous.

"I am so grateful to all those who support us and allow us to be close to the people. Aid to the Church in Need has helped our priests in this way, so that they can provide spiritual support to those who suffer, and I would like to express my thanks to all those who have contributed, making this possible. Furthermore, another way of ensuring a spiritual presence is by producing radio programs, which you help to support. Except that the antenna destroyed by Cyclone Chido will have to be rebuilt.

These many ways of being God's presence are manifested through your generosity. Without you, thousands of Mozambicans would already be dead, victims of an enduring conflict.

You are certainly aware of the violence that regularly shakes the Middle East. In Lebanon, our Eastern-rite Christian sisters and brothers are not spared. In the village of Sharfé, home to the only Syriac Catholic seminary in the world, 15 seminarians continue their training, despite insecurity, fear, and the extreme violence of falling bombs.

You support the pillars of the Church in Lebanon: priests and religious. Thus, they accompany the faithful, celebrate the sacraments, and organize summer camps for youth, often travelling long distances to reach remote villages, including in predominantly Muslim regions. Their presence is a living testimony of faith and resilience.

In a letter to ACN, the rector of the seminary, Msgr. Jules Boutros, warmly thanks you:

"I would like to thank you for all the good that you have done for our Eastern Churches in the Middle East. Thank you for your care and commitment and for considering us here in Lebanon as part of the one Body of Christ, for your aid that will be sustaining the long heritage and the good work of our seminary. Thanks to the benefactors who trust our shared mission. We assure our prayer to every one of you. I ask and pray to the Lord Jesus Christ to bless all your works and efforts."

The Church is involved in emergency aid linked to the economic crisis and war, but cannot ask its faithful to support Lebanon's future priests alone. She also needs you, trusting that you will respond with love. Thanks to your generosity, the future of the Syriac Catholic Church in Lebanon is one of hope. A donation of \$150 will help ensure the training of a seminarian for one month.

Your solidarity with our Pakistani sisters in Christ contributes to their dignity


